- Is my child ready for "Big School" (kindergarten)?
- How do I help my child learn to read and write at home?
- How do I help my child learn STEAM skills at home?






The Office of Early Learning's Transition to Kindergarten page offers resources for families, schools and communities to make the transition to "Big School" much easier for their children.

Transition refers to the totality of experiences and opportunities a child encounters in moving from one program or setting to another. Opportunities and experiences that familiarize children and families with new settings, expectations and relationships can help make connections that ease adjustments. When transitions are effective they provide the supports children need to make these adjustments. When children make successful transitions they:

- Enjoy school and look forward to going.
- Show steady growth in academic and social skills.
- Have families who are more actively engaged in their learning.

Florida's Early Learning and Developmental Standards









A child's development of values, learning skills and social skills begins at birth. Each child's learning and development starts at home. The Florida Early Learning and **Developmental Standards help** families support their children's learning and development from birth to age five. Standards and benchmarks reflect the knowledge and skills that a child on a typical developmental progression should know and be able to do at the end of an age-related timeframe. The resources provided on the Office of Early Learning's (OEL) website help families understand how their child grows and develops. Families can use the activities and information to extend their child's learning at home.

The *Families* page allows a parent to find information and activities appropriate for the age of their child. Apps, videos, and other websites that help parents support the standards are available for parents on the page as well.

The Domains of Florida's Early Learning and Developmental Standards

PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

(general health and development of physical skills involving large and small muscles)

APPROACHES TO LEARNING

SOCIAL & EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT (the ability to establish and maintain positive relationships with others)

LANGUAGE & LITERACY

(the ability to understand words, learn to talk and learn about books and reading)



MATHEMATICAL THINKING

(the ability to think about relationships between objects, numbers, shapes, sizes, weights and other concepts)

SCIENTIFIC INQUIRY

(the ability to explore the environment using the five senses, connecting what is observed to science concepts and asking questions)

SOCIAL STUDIES

(the ability to learn about people and the community)

Growing Together: Ready for School & Beyond

There are 13 videos designed for families to learn more about the importance of partnering with their child's school and how to boost their child's learning at home. Getting involved in school activities encourages learning inside and outside the classroom. 4 things providers can do with these resources:

- 1. Introduce the available resources to teachers and staff to try before they share the resources with families.
- 2. Use these resources in parent meetings and newsletters or provide links to them on their websites to emphasize the importance of a family's role in the healthy development and learning of their children.
- 3. Emphasize positive communication with families while encouraging them to use some of the activities and resources such as the <u>Ready Freddy Calendar</u> to support their children's learning at home.
- 4. Provide professional development to teachers and staff on ways to encourage families to use the resources with bilingual children and children with different abilities.

4 things families can do with these resources:

- 1. Use the resources to find activities they will enjoy doing at home to support and extend what their child is learning at school or in a child care program.
- 2. Use the Office of Early Learning's (OEL's) <u>Back to School</u> webpage to support their children's development of the skills, knowledge, and attitudes necessary for success in school.
- 3. Find a variety of tools, activities, websites and videos on OEL's website to help their children learn the <u>Florida Early Learning and Developmental Standards</u>.
- 4. Locate information, tools, and resources to support the healthy development of their children with different abilities.
